- >Look for connections and groupings of parables – Ex. Luke 15, lost things
- >Keep the Main Thing the Main Thing
 The Kingdom is the Main Thing

Archelaus Son of Herod the Great

Traveled to Rome in 4 B.C. to be crowned King of Judea

Jews appealed to Caesar Augustus to have him removed

Deposed in 6 A.D. and exiled to Gaul (France)

Ag Possible basis for today's parable

Introduction – Luke 19:11

This parable is told at Zacchaeus' house just before the Triumphal Entry of Jesus into Jerusalem

Jesus had already told them in Luke 18:31-34 what would happen when He entered Jerusalem and He gave them His mission statement in Luke 19:10.

Even the people hailing him on Palm Sunday as the "King who comes inthe name of the Lord" saw him as a conquering Messiah as found in Isaiah 11 and other Old Testament passages.

This parable sets the record straight on what was going to happen in the immediate and distant future.

V. 13 - Engage in business until I come.

πραγματεύομαι – pragmateuomai
 (prag-mat-yoo'-om-ahee)
 to transact business
 (think of our word pragmatic)

II. The Subject's Response – Luke 19:14-25

4 Responses to the Nobleman's departing declaration and instructions

- **1. Rejection of his authority**
- 2. Took seriously the instructions to "engage in business"
- 3. Took more moderate approach to "engage in business"
- 4. Took no action at all when told to "engage in business"



The King's Response Luke 19:26-27





III. The King's Response – Luke 19:26-27

4 Responses by the King upon his return

- 1. Rewarded the serious businessman
- 2. Rewarded the moderate businessman
- 3. Rebuked the inactive businessman and redistributed his money
- 4. Killed those who opposed him
- A. 1 Corinthians 3:10-15

Your Response

Jesus has returned in victory to the Father and He will come again in judgment.

In the meantime you are to engage in Kingdom business. Matthew 28:18-20 and Luke 19:10
